Global Salve Short-Term Study Abroad 2025 Program Options





Winter Break in the Amazon

January 6-14, 2025 Dr. Jameson Chace 1- credit Apply by: Sept. 24 Students will charter Motor Yacht Tucano through the remote wilderness rainforest via the least inhabited major river in the Amazon Basin, the Rio Negro. This program offers students the opportunity to study first-hand the evolutionary ecology of plant and animal taxa in tropical forest ecosystems. Students will explore the ecological dynamics of diverse tropical habitats as well as the human dimensions of tropical systems and principles of conservation biology.

This week long program offers Dance majors the opportunity to study at Decidedly Jazz Danceworks (DJD) in Calgary, Alberta, Canada— the home to a professional jazz company and school that has been thriving for 39 years. Students will take classes that explore the jazz continuum through the DJD aesthetic while also learning about the business and art of running a non-profit school and company. The program kicks off with a day trip to Banff National Park where students can get a taste of the Canadian Rocky Mountains and view glacial lakes and streams.

Public Health in Ireland

May 25-June 8, 2025 Dr. Michelle McCarthy & Dr. Debra Cherubini 3- credits Apply by: Dec. 1 This program offers students a unique opportunity to compare and contrast public health education, policies and the delivery of health care within Ireland, Northern Ireland and the United States by applying theoretical concepts of health care policy and nursing in an international setting. Epidemiolocal principles will be utilized in discussing global health issues, environmental health, infectious disease and health disparities within populations, both within the U.S. and abroad. Students begin the course on campus in the spring semester and complete the course in Limerick, Ireland.

During this 3- week intensive political economy program, Salve Regina students, with Dr. Adam Witham, will accompany Hampden-Sydney College students and faculty to Harris Manchester College at the University of Oxford. Studying in Oxford will allow students to learn the theory, history, and application of political economy in an experiential setting. The program will include a weekend trip to London as well as excursions to various sites in Oxford.

Mid-Late June, 2025 Prof. Paul McKillop 3- credits Apply by: Jan. 17 During this 2 week program hosted by Mary Immaculate College in Limerick, Ireland, students will have the opportunity to explore the relationship between sports and tourism and the development and management of sports tourism in Ireland. On site highlights include visits to iconic Irish stadiums such as Croke Park and TUS Gaelic Grounds, a visit to the International Rugby Experience in Limerick, a hurling experience, various guest speakers including GAA leadership an overnight trip to Dublin, and more!



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Summer in Tanzania

July 6-19, 2025 Dr. Missy Varao & Dr. Teresa Starzecki 3- credits Apply by: Jan. 17 This program will focus on providing students with a comprehensive understanding of the business principles and practices of ecotourism within the context of Tanzania's diverse ecosystems. Salve Regina students will be hosted by the School for International Training (SIT) at their Tanzania site. The program includes visits to the Mto wa Mbu village, Ngorongoro Park Kibosho village, Materuni Waterfall, one of the most well-known features of Tanzania, the Northern Tanzania Beekeeping Company, mountainous regions, including nearby Mount Kilimanjaro, and more! There will also be a variety of guest lectures both at site visits and excursions, an Arusha city tour, and visits to various non-governmental organizations.

This program is offered in conjunction with St. Clare's College of Oxford. This 4-week summer program presents students with a wide range of academic course choices in business, literature, art history, and theology. This program offers frequent field trips in and around Oxford as well as day trips to London, Bath and Stonehenge. The program emphasizes experiential learning, with trips to Oxford sites featured in the courses such as Alice in Wonderland's Port Meadow, Jane Austen's Bath, Christ Church College (the model for Harry Potter's Hogwarts), the Mini Cooper plant and the British Museum.

Summer in France

Late May-Late June, 2025 Dr. James Mitchell 6- credits Apply by: Jan. 17 During this beginner French language immersion program, students will stay in Pau situated in southwest France, not far from the French Atlantic coast and Spain. Students will be able to complete their entire language core requirement in just 5 weeks while immersing themselves in the local culture of Pau. Hosted by the University Studies Abroad Consortium (USAC) Pau site, Salve students will join USAC students on excursions to the Basque Coast, Pyrenees Mountains, and have a free weekend for independent travel.

During this 4-week program, students will join the Summer Session I program at the American University of Rome (AUR) in Rome, Italy. All students will be required to take the "Philosophy of Science" course with Dr. Condella and then choose a second course from the AUR Summer Session portfolio of courses. This program offers a unique opportunity to fulfill a variety of core and/or major requirements. The experience includes a weekend trip to the Tuscan cities of Florence, Siena, Trequanda, and Montecatini where students will visit cathedrals, palaces, city squares, all amid beautiful landscapes.

Summer in Reggio Emilia

Late May-Late June, 2025 Dr. Tracy Pelkowski 6- credits Apply by: Jan. 17 This 4-week program, is offered in conjunction with the University Studies Abroad Consortium (USAC). Students enroll in a childhood development course and will immerse themselves in the cultural context of Italian childhood, participating in a highly interactive format involving presentations, readings, guest speakers, and tours. Students will learn from Italian professionals in the family services and educational fields who work directly with children. Students choose a second course offered by a local faculty member. Excursions to Bologna and Rimini allow for exploration of the region.
