Combine Traditional Counselor Education with a Holistic Perspective

Through a holistic, justice-centered, and developmental perspective, the 48-credit Master of Arts degree in Holistic Counseling (H.C.) program trains students to work in various settings utilizing traditional counseling techniques and systems thinking with awareness of neuroscience and evidence-supported integrative practices. The courses provide counselors-in-training with holistic and systemic approaches to frame their future work. The program trains students to work in various settings utilizing traditional counseling techniques and systems thinking with awareness of neuroscience and evidence-supported integrative practices. The program seeks to help students learn and understand how to observe, assess, and incorporate the integration of body, mind, and spirit into their professional and personal lives. We integrate awareness of the Five Critical Concerns for Mercy into our training, including racism, issues impacting

women, immigration, the earth, and violence. Students learn to see clients in a multifaceted, holistic way through understanding various systemic and cultural experiences.

Students in this program engage in both didactic and



interactive coursework, completing a 100-clinical hour supervised practicum in the field at the end of the program. Upon completing this degree, students can not become licensed mental health counselors until completing the additional 12-credit Certificate in Advanced Graduate Studies in Clinical Mental Health: Concentration in Holistic Counseling program. A few states, such as Massachusetts, do not allow counselors-in-training to become licensed if they have not completed a 60-credit mental health counseling program. Thus a 48-credit program + CAGS does not qualify students to get licensed in those states.

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Admissions Requirements

Individuals with a bachelor's degree in any undergraduate major from a regionally accredited college or university (or an equivalent degree from an accredited institution outside of the United States) may apply to this program.

Application materials are submitted online at salve.edu/graduate-admissions. There is no fee to apply. Salve Regina University evaluates the total application package; you must submit the following to be considered:

- Completed graduate application
- Official transcripts from each college/ university attended
- Personal statement
- Two professional letters of recommendation
- Resume
