Measure the individual aggregate levels of these economic, cultural, and Mercy Mission-related civic contributions




Identify the many ways in which SRU impacts Newport and Aquidneck Island.

Backward Linkage

Money from Salve goes back through the community in taxes, groceries, restaurants, etc.



Fixed Purchase Patterns of Economic Producer

There are no significant changes in the categories of things we buy each month/year



Economic Producer Homogeneity

The categories that make up the Salve economic impact stay relatively consistent each year.



Demonstrable Time Dimension

The time frame studied has a clear beginning and end.



No Unique Economic Producer Supply Constraints

Nothing really significant or extraordinary happened to drastically alter the earning or spending characteristics of Salve or the general employment situation.



Salve Economic Impact General Definitions

Contribution Study

Identifies a consolidated regional economic producer and examines the total economic contribution to a regional economy

Direct Impact

Change in economic activity resulting from the initial round of goods and services purchased by the economic producer

Indirect Impact

Change in economic activity resulting from subsequent rounds of goods and services purchased by industries initially affected by the economic producer's direct impact

Induced Impact

Change in economic activity resulting from changes in spending by workers whose earnings are affected by the economic producer's direct impact

RIMSII Multiplier Overview

Type II Multipliers

 Multipliers that account for both the interindustry (direct & indirect) effects and household spending effects (induced) produced by the economic producer activity

Total Final Demand Output Multiplier

 Represents the total dollar change that occurs in all industries within the regional economy for each additional dollar of output delivered by the economic producer.

Total Final Demand Employment Multiplier

 Represents the total change in the number of jobs that occurs in all industries within the regional economy for each additional \$1M of output delivered by the economic producer






