SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The following is an analysis of a Rhode Island state survey conducted by the Pell Center at Salve Regina University. The survey, fielded by Embold Research between June 16-22, 2024 via the web and SMS messaging, gathered responses from 804 likely voters in Rhode Island, with a modeled margin of error of 3.6%. Demographics of survey participants can be found at the end of the report.

Weighting parameters are based on the demographic composition of registered voters in Rhode Island, based on voter file data.

'2024 voters' are defined as individuals registered to vote in Rhode Island who voted in the 2024 presidential election. This is a strong indicator of likelihood to vote in future elections and allows for comparisons with likely voters in previous surveys.





SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

VIEWPOINTS ON THE HEALTH OF DEMOCRAY

Well over half of Rhode Islanders (63%) believe the United States democracy is not healthy. Democrats are the most likely to believe this; 80% say our democracy is not healthy, more than twice as many as the percent of Republicans who agree (34%). Republicans are seven times more likely to agree that our democracy is healthy than they were one year ago. This is likely due in large part to the change of power in the executive branch. As is common throughout the report, Independents—or those not registered with the Democratic or Republican party—split the difference between their party counterparts: 59% say democracy is not healthy.

Despite concerns over democratic health, Rhode Islanders are nearly evenly split on whether they agree that the United States is operating as a democracy. Democrats (51%) and Republicans (53%) are more likely than not to agree that our government is defined as one, but Independents are divided equally: 47% agree and 46% disagree.

It follows then that well over half of survey participants agree that the United States is facing a constitutional crisis (64%). Democrats overwhelmingly believe this (94%), compared to only 27% of Republicans and 55% of Independents. Democrats perceive a decline in the strength of the checks and balance system, which likely bolsters their sense of democratic backsliding. Only one-third (32%) agree the system is strong while 64% agree that country has fallen into dictatorship.

Relatedly, 83% of Democrats believe the policies of the current Trump administration have hurt them personally, compared to only 6% of Republicans. Independents are nearly evenly split; 35% say the policies have neither helped nor hurt them.

TOP ISSUES AND CONCERNS

On the economy – a hot button election issue – three-quarters of Republicans (76%) believe it is thriving, while 73% of Democrats believe we are in a recession. Only 17% of respondents chose the economy as one of the top three most important issues facing the country, however. Over half of Republicans tapped immigration (58%) as a top issue while Democrats chose Trump and the Republicans (66%) and the state of Democracy (36%) as main concerns. Independents were split on a wider number of issues; about one-third chose Trump and the Republicans (28%), inflation and the cost of living (34%), immigration (34%), and polarization and division (28%).

Given their concern on the issue of immigration and their party support for Trump, 91% of Republicans support the administration's decision to deploy U.S. military troops in response to protests over the federal government's approach to immigration enforcement. Almost all of Republicans (93%) want the federal government to increase spending on the boarder and immigration enforcement.

Despite major disagreements on issues like immigration and the economy, members of all parties largely want the federal government to increase spending on Medicare and Social Security. Enhanced funding for Social Security is overwhelmingly popular: 82% of Democrats, 75% of Republicans, and 70% of Independents agree. Democrats would also like increased funding for Medicaid (78%) and education (89%), while Republicans support more funds for defense (68%). Independents are again spread on a wider range of issues: half or more also want funding increased to Medicaid, education, and immigration.







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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

IMPORTANCE OF IDENTITY

Despite – or perhaps because of – high levels of concern for the health of U.S. Democracy, being an American is an important identity for most Rhode Islanders. Nearly all of Republicans (96%) say it is extremely or very important, compared to 77% of Independents and 60% of Democrats.

Rhode Islanders are less connected to their political party identity. Just as with their American identity, Democrats are the least likely to say it is extremely or very important (53%) while Independents, interestingly, are the most likely to say it is important (67%).

PERCEPTIONS OF POLITICAL POLARIZATION

Rhode Islanders overwhelmingly agree that political polarization has increased in the last year (83%). Democrats drove the overall percent increase, however: over 90% say polarization has increased, compared to 73% in June 2024. On the other hand, the percent of Republicans who agree that polarization has increased dropped by 15 percentage points between June 2024 (86%) and June 2025 (71%).

Disinformation and fake news are tapped as one of the biggest contributors to political polarization by all three parties, just as they were in June 2024. But in June 2025, Republicans are more likely to believe Democratic officials are a main cause of polarization over any other factor (58% compared to 41% in 2024).

Democrats and Republicans hold deeply negative views of their political counterparts. Over half of Democrats believe Republicans are very closeminded, dishonest, and immoral. Three-quarters of Republicans view Democrats as close-minded and dishonest; about two-thirds view them as immoral and lazy. Independents, comprised of a mix of left and right leaning people, are less likely to judge their counterparts as harshly. They are about two times less likely to say Republicans or Democrats are close-minded.

NEWS CONSUMPTION HABITS

Independents and Democrats get their news from a variety of sources. Over a third tune into local TV news and network channels like CBS and ABC. Democrats also turn to sources like national and local newspapers, local radio, CNN, and MSNBC. Republicans turn to FOX News nearly twice as much as any other news sources apart from local TV news.

Three-quarters of Rhode Islanders avoid the news (32%), but they are slightly less likely to do so than they were a year ago. Republicans drove the overall shift; they are about 40 percent less likely to avoid the news in June 2025 than they were in June 2024.

Nearly half of respondents avoid news on national politics (48%). Republicans are the least likely to avoid news on this topic (31%), but they are the most likely to avoid news related to social justice and climate change, and they avoid these topics at higher rates than they did a year ago. Over onethird Democrats (36%) avoid news about the Israel-Hamas war while the same percent of Republicans avoid news about the war in Ukraine.





SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

RHODE ISLAND STATE MATTERS

Job performance approval ratings for three of Rhode Island's four Congressional representatives dipped between June 2024 and June 2025. Representative Gabe Amo saw a 2 percentage point increase in net approval (+11), though Senator Reed holds the highest net approval rating (+12). Governor Dan McKee's approval rating dropped from 36% in June 2024 to 25% in June 2025.

In June 2025, Rhode Island officials estimated the Washington Bridge will be rebuilt by November 2028 and cost \$427 million. Survey respondents, no matter their political party, are broadly skeptical the project will end on time and on budget: nearly 60% say it's not likely at all and Republicans are the most skeptical at 80%.

Before the Rhode Island state congressional session ended in June 2025, the legislative body considered or proposed a wide variety of legislation, from an assault rifles ban to a state bottle refund program, among others. About three-quarters of respondents support the proposed Millionaire's tax (71%), which included a 3% income tax surcharge on highest earners; increased Medicaid reimbursements to primary care doctors (77%); and an increase to minimum wage, either one-time (72%) or gradual (75%). A modified minimum wage increase bill passed while the other two pieces of legislation stalled in committee.

Over half of respondents support a state-wide assault rifles ban (54%), which also passed in modified form, and a state-wide bottle refund program (59%), which was delayed to the next session due to proposed amendments.





PERCEPTIONS OF U.S. DEMOCRACY

Though only a little over a third of Republicans in June 2025 believe the U.S. democracy is healthy, the group is seven times more likely to agree that it is than they were one year ago. Inversely, twice as many 2025 Democrats say our democracy is not healthy at all.
