Become a Certified Rehabilitation Counselor

Salve's M.A. in Rehabilitation Counseling program is a 48-credit program designed to prepare professional counselors to assist people with disabilities to achieve their goals in regard to employment, independent living and participation in the community. Rehabilitation counseling is the only profession that assists people with mental health issues and co-occurring disabilities.

Rehabilitation counseling is the only counseling profession that educates students in mental health counseling, co-occurring chronic illnesses and disabilities, and the importance of employment/careers as a means for people with disabilities to achieve financial independence. It is a holistic approach to working with people with a variety of disabilities who represent diverse cultural, ethnic and linguistic backgrounds.

Our program is accredited by the Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE), certifying that it meets national standards. In addition, our faculty and instructors are comprised of full-time faculty as well as working rehabilitation counselors, clinical counselors and psychologists. This program was accredited by CACREP on July 1, 2017. The program leads to national certification as a rehabilitation counselor. With an additional 12 credits, students completing this program can also become licensed mental health counselors.

Admission Requirements

Individuals with a bachelor's degree in any undergraduate major from a regionally accredited college or university (or an equivalent degree from an accredited institution outside of the United States) may apply to this program. Salve Regina University evaluates the total application package.

Application materials are submitted online at salve.edu/grad. There is no fee to apply. Salve Regina University evaluates the total application package; you must submit the following to be considered:

- Completed graduate application
- Official transcripts from each college/university attended
- Personal statement
- Two professional letters of recommendation
- Resume

Program Objectives

- To develop the student's working knowledge of a full range of disabilities and their implications for living and working.
- To challenge students to examine counseling theories and practice, disability case management, and assessment from a multicultural perspective in individual, group, family and mental health counseling.
- To develop a student's values so they are consistent with practices that respect human dignity, support informed choice, and promote independent living.
- To learn theories of human development and growth in all areas including human growth across the life span, individual and family response to disability, and learning styles and strategies.
- To provide practical skills in job and transferable skills analysis, job development and placement, work site modifications, career counseling and development, and supported employment options.
- To expand the counseling and consultation skills of students to include working with families, groups, schools and employers for effective systems change.
- To acquaint students with research methodology to become intelligent consumers and creators of research.
- To enable students to develop collaborative relationships with individuals with disabilities for effective disability case management.
